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FADE IN

EXT. PARK SIDEWALK - DAY ALAN, a young man, jogs. He stops for a break. A young MAN jogs up to him for a break. They have a brief conversation. They shake hands. After a friendly farewell, Alan jogs away. The other man jogs off in the opposite direction. EXT. SKY - DAY GEESE fly by. EXT. PARK SIDEWALK - DAY Alan stops to look at something. EXT. PARK LAWN - DAY A few geese graze. FLASHBACK on a festive Holiday meal with people around a table. A cooked goose lays on a platter. ALAN This is good! I've never had goose before. Alan approaches the geese on the lawn. The geese slowly move away. ALAN (CONT'D) You guys taste good. One of the best meals I've ever had! A goose turns to hiss.

> ALAN (CONT'D) Ok, but don't push your luck. Your (MORE)

> > (CONTINUED)

ALAN (CONT'D) goose could be cooked.

The geese squawk among themselves.

ALAN (CONT'D) Ah shut up you dumb clucks.

VOICE (O.S.) And you're gay as a goose!

Alan quickly turns around.

ALAN

What the ...

MIKE, a friend, is behind him.

MIKE Stop harassing them! Goose Pervert!

ALAN What are you doing here?

MIKE Just out for a walk and take a look at my friends here.

ALAN

Well, they are all just doing whatever they do. What does gay as a goose mean?

MIKE I don't know, but it sounds good.

ALAN But, why to me?

MIKE Not to worry. Just a joke unless there's something you want to tell me.

ALAN No, not about that.

MIKE Good, but you never know these days and it would not be a problem for me. ALAN Thanks, good to know old friend.

EXT. PARK SIDEWALK - DAY

Mike walks with Alan.

MIKE

How are you doing? Did you get my message the other day?

ALAN

Yes, I've been meaning to call. I'm all right, just busy with finals and wanting to run away.

MIKE

Yeah, well hang in there. Janet and I are engaged.

ALAN

Oh, congratulations.

MIKE Thanks, the big plunge.

ALAN Yeah, but are you ready?

MIKE

I truly love her, so the risk is worth taking.

ALAN Well, love may conquer all.

MIKE So, they say. I want you to be the best man.

ALAN Well, of course.

MIKE

Great, you being there means a lot. It's going to be a medium size in late June.

ALAN Well, you know I'll be there, and I want to hear all about it, but I've (MORE) з.

ALAN (CONT'D) really got to get going now. The books are waiting. MIKE Sure, let's get together soon and thanks for wanting to do this. ALAN You're welcome. MIKE Great. Say hi to Susan. ALAN Yes. They quickly hug. EXT. PARK SIDEWALK - DAY Alan jogs. INT. DESK - DAY Alan reads a book. He closes it to reveal a psychology textbook. He types at a computer. INT. SOFA - DAY Alan ponders alone. He picks up a phone nearby to make a call. ALAN Hi, it's me. Sorry you're not home. Hope to see you soon. Bye. INT. BEDROOM - NIGHT A pensive Alan lays in bed on his side. SUSAN, a young girl, brings her arm and face up over him from behind.

SUSAN Good morning.

ALAN Good morning.

Susan seeks affection, but he is unresponsive.

SUSAN Are you all right? A penny for your thoughts.

ALAN It will cost more than that. I've just got a lot on my mind.

SUSAN Ok, but let me know if you want. I have more cash than a penny.

ALAN

Will do.

Alan remains on his side as Susan retreats.

EXT. PARK BENCH - DAY

Alan eats a sandwich as he looks out.

EXT. LAWN - DAY

Geese graze.

EXT. PARK BENCH - DAY

Alan takes a small bag of chips from the lunch.

He moves away.

EXT. LAWN - DAY

Alan approaches to watch the geese.

He opens the bag of chips.

He takes them out to crush.

They scatter on the grass below.

The geese cautiously approach to feed on them.

EXT. PARK LEDGE - DAY

Alan stands to overlook a RIVER.

Two GEESE mingle among rocks and driftwood.

A friendly WOMAN and MAN approach the ledge with a small bag to look over.

WOMAN

Hi Alvin!

MAN

Hi Maggy!

They look towards the geese below as Alan watches.

They take grain out of the bag to throw towards the geese.

ALAN I gave them chips before.

WOMAN

Oh, yes. But, this is cracked corn. They really like this. Don't you Maggy?

ALAN You gave them names?

MAN Yes, they know us. We come here a lot.

ALAN

I didn't know they could get that familiar.

WOMAN

Oh yes, they are very smart and have good memories.

MAN

We know these two and have seen them with their babies. One year they had ten, but only three lived.

ALAN

They are monogamous, aren't they?

WOMAN

Yes, and good parents. They remember where they were born and come back. This is their natural habitat. ALAN How do you know which gender? They both look alike.

MAN I know. You have to get up close and personal to find out. But they know.

ALAN That's good. I guess that's all that matters.

MAN Yes, it's too bad that they didn't make a larger area for them when they planned the park.

The couple throws more grain towards the geese as Alan looks on.

After a brief time, they walk away with "goodbyes" to Alan as they happily hold hands.

ALAN Nice talking to you.

EXT. PARK - DAY

Alan walks with Susan.

ALAN I apologize for being so mysterious.

SUSAN That's ok. Is something bothering you? Like school?

ALAN Yes, but not school.

SUSAN

Well, maybe we should talk about it.

They continue to walk in silence until Alan gestures towards a bench.

EXT. BENCH - DAY

Susan and Alan sit together.

ALAN I'm scared.

SUSAN About what?

ALAN

Us.

SUSAN Well, so am I. Maybe that is good.

ALAN

Why?

SUSAN It's something we have in common.

FLASH on Geese in flight.

EXT. PARK - DAY

From a distance, Susan with Alan continue their conversation on the bench.

EXT. BENCH - DAY

Susan with Alan continue to sit together.

ALAN I have been tormenting about this for quite a while, so before I explode...

SUSAN Yes, let's do it!

ALAN

What?

SUSAN Get engaged so you don't have to explode!

ALAN No, this is all fucked up!

SUSAN What, you don't want to get engaged?

ALAN No, I'm gay. I wasn't trying to (MORE)

ALAN (CONT'D)

deceive you. I really like you, but I've got to stop deceiving myself before it's too late!

SUSAN

Well, I was falling in love with you! And I just made a fool of myself about getting engaged!

She gets up to leave.

ALAN

Please don't go! I know, I had feelings for you as far as they could go. That's why this is so hard! I need you right now to understand!

She sits back down.

SUSAN

This changes so much, but this is the most honest we have been together. I felt the growing distance between us. Are you sure about this?

ALAN Yes, but this coming out thing is a scary new trip.

SUSAN

Yes, it could be but try to be happy about it and not worry. About this gay thing think of it this way. Some are and some aren't, that's all. Either way, you're going to be just fine.

ALAN That's beautiful. Thanks, I needed that. I feel lost.

SUSAN Well, it looks like you have been found.

ALAN I hope so. Still friends?

SUSAN Yes, I hope still one of your best.

ALAN

Absolutely! I am not going away.

They hug and then kiss with resolution.

With affection, they get up.

EXT. PARK - DAY

Susan with Alan Walk closely on a path.

ALAN Now there is something else to do.

He takes a plastic bag of grain out of his pocket to show.

SUSAN

What?

ALAN Come on let's go.

He takes her hand as they walk on the path.

EXT. PARK LEDGE - DAY

Alan guides Susan to look below at the rocks and driftwood.

SUSAN This is beautiful.

ALAN I know, but they're not here.

SUSAN

Who?

ALAN Come on, you'll see.

EXT. PARK - DAY

FLASH scenes among other people as Alan looks for something with Susan in tow.

The geese Maggie and Alvin are on the distance on a lawn with others.

Alan with Susan move towards them.

Alan throws grain to them.

CONTINUED: They take off in flight to his disappointment. ALAN This is the corn they like! EXT. SKY - DAY Maggie and Alvin are in flight. ALVIN (O.S.) Come on Maggie, let's get outa here. It's that same guy maybe with those nasty chips. And he talked about eating us! MAGGIE (O.S.) Yeah, let's go! EXT. PARK - DAY Alan and Susan continue to walk. FLASH scenes as dusk approaches with no geese in sight. ALAN This is weird! SUSAN Where did they all go? ALAN They knew I was coming out and are trying to avoid me. SUSAN Yes, that's it. They have all decided to hide from you. ALAN Just so long as you don't hide from me. SUSAN No, you are stuck with my friendship. ALAN Great. SUSAN I wish you the best with all this because you are the best and will make (MORE)

SUSAN (CONT'D) some guy very happy.

ALAN Thanks, you are also the best.

He looks upward to yell out.

ALAN (CONT'D) Hey you guys. Everything is going better. I apologize about making cracks about eating you! Let's make peace! Also, it's ok to be as gay as a goose!

Susan with Alan share the humor.

EXT. SKY - DAY

Geese fly above.

EXT. PARK - DAY

Alan with Susan stand as they gently throw grain below for the cautious, but receptive geese.
