The Last Day of Comics

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FADE IN:

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Establishing.

Medium-sized in the Chicago suburbs.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Framed posters of old comic book movies are all on the walls.

Rows of comic books as far as the eye can see.

Comic Book Clerk and film school dropout COLTON (20s) puts a handful of comic books in a box.

He's tall and dorkishly handsome. An older Sri Lankan death metal band t-shirt hangs off him.

Colton stops and looks at a comic book.

It's of a morbidly obese superhero having tea with the King of England on top of the Eiffel Tower.

COLTON

Who's the audience for this?

JADE (20s) draws a comic book on a tablet computer.

She has long, dark hair and soul-piercing eyes.

A t-shirt with an older fantasy comic book cover on it clings to her curves.

Her eyes focus on the tablet.

A red-headed woman fights off an ugly serial killer.

Jade erases everything it.

JADE I'm never going to finish this.

Colton puts the comic book into a box.

COLTON What's wrong this time?

JADE I can't get the Big Red Bastard right and it's killing me. He's a creepy, generic villain.

Jade puts the tablet down.

JADE I hate it but I can't think of anything else, either.

COLTON Let's say you're making Vengeance in Red, the movie. Who's going to play him?

She thinks for a long moment.

JADE

A young Steve Buscemi type.

Colton places another comic book in the box.

COLTON

I love him.

JADE Everyone does but he's also not the most... traditionally handsome guy.

COLTON

And someone called the Big Red Bastard probably looks kind of like a... big ugly bastard.

JADE

But I need him to be on a date with a woman, too, and a guy like that--

COLTON Probably isn't a panty dropper.

She glares at him.

COLTON (CONT'D) It'd be subversive if he was like this handsome movie star type.

JADE

I'm already out there on this, I need a little bit of mainstream accessibility in it.

LENORA (70s) walks in.

She's short, thin, and looks her age.

Colton spots her. His eyes light up.

JADE (CONT'D) I'm going to grab some fresh air.

Jade leaves.

LENORA She always does that.

COLTON Jade thinks you indulge me.

LENORA She just has lousy taste in comics. (beat) The doctor is upping my dosage today, so I'll be there for an hour more than usual.

He sprints over to a box and opens it up.

COLTON No one has even looked at these in about a year, so I can give you a deal on the series.

LENORA Do I want that sort of commitment?

Colton takes out a comic book. It has monsters in a garage rock band on the cover.

COLTON Scare Tactics is only twelve issues and has a proper conclusion.

Lenora looks at the cover.

COLTON (CONT'D) DC just went for it with their Weirdoverse for a couple of years and it didn't sell for shit. The comics are great, though. (beat) I need to pick your brain about something, if you wouldn't mind.

LENORA

Shoot.

EXT. TOWNHOUSE - DAY (1 WEEK LATER)

Poorly maintained in a sea of them.

A Black 1976 Pontiac Firebird Trans-Am is parked up front.

INT. LIVING ROOM - DAY

Colton types on an older laptop.

Several comic book-themed stickers are on it.

A movie script is on the screen.

His phone buzzes with a Facetime call from professional screenwriter GILBERT (20s).

A brand new, pressed dress shirt is tailored to him.

COLTON I'm almost done.

GILBERT (FACETIME) You're a fucking lifesaver, man.

A photo of Colton's girlfriend ERIKA (20s), her ex DAVID (30s), and their son Zachariah (5) is on the wall.

She's an All-American blonde.

COLTON What does your boss have to say about all of this?

GILBERT (FACETIME) The producer loves my new spin on the dialogue in this.

COLTON Hit my Cash App and--

GILBERT (FACETIME) My agent figured it out.

COLTON If it's a legal thing--

GILBERT (FACETIME) She said it's all good, as long as you're OK with the whole shadowy figure thing. COLTON You can thank me in your memoirs.

GILBERT (FACETIME) I sent her the last thing I had from you in film school. She wants an introduction.

COLTON My current WIP isn't ready.

GILBERT (FACETIME) An agent at CAA wants to meet you and that's what you have to say.

Colton saves the file.

GILBERT (FACETIME) (CONT'D) Do you remember Kent?

COLTON Did he give himself permission to write something?

GILBERT (FACETIME) This is his original.

COLTON I was wondering why you suddenly forgot how to write.

Colton emails it to Gilbert.

GILBERT (FACETIME) I've got a couch if you want it.

COLTON I've got my life here.

GILBERT (FACETIME) Is something wrong with your old man or what?

COLTON It didn't work the first time, this would be just more of the same.

GILBERT (FACETIME) Film school and the film industry are like two entirely different beasts altogether. (beat) Say hi to the boys for me! Gilbert hangs up.

Erika walks in and sits down next to him.

ERIKA How come I never get to talk to your friends?

COLTON It's just Gil.

ERIKA What does he do?

COLTON He's a writer.

She looks at his laptop.

ERIKA It looks like you're doing the writing for him.

COLTON He needed a favor.

ERIKA So that's what you've been working on when Zach's around.

COLTON That's something of my own.

ERIKA Can I see it?

COLTON It's not ready.

ERIKA Isn't this what all writers crave?

COLTON What if you don't like it?

ERIKA

It's just me.

Colton looks around.

COLTON You'll think it's silly. ERIKA Would Zach think it's silly?

COLTON He's not my biggest fan.

ERIKA He'll come around, I promise.

COLTON It's called Scalpels and Silencers.

ERIKA So it's like a medical thing?

COLTON

It's about a doctor who goes to jail and then gets out to find he can't practice anymore. So he winds up being one of those fix-it guys for the Russian mob while he tries to become a doctor again.

ERIKA Why would he do that?

COLTON

His kid has cancer and he needs the money. It's about how he falls deeper and deeper into the life of being a gangster.

ERIKA

Now I want to read it because it sounds amazing!

Colton's phone buzzes with an alarm.

COLTON I got to get to work.

They lightly kiss.

Colton leaves.

EXT. RANCH HOME - DAY

Freshly painted.

A Luxury Sedan is parked up front.

Through a bay window, we see Jade sitting at a table, drawing comic book panels in a well-weathered notepad full of them.

INT. KITCHEN - DAY

Straight out of Martha Stewart's dreams.

Jade's eyes focus on her pencil for a long moment.

A pair of mostly eaten toaster oven waffles and a mug of coffee are in front of her.

She looks over and sees her mug being refilled.

Her eyes see her boyfriend FRED (30s) carefully fill it up.

He's tall, dark, and handsome.

They lightly kiss.

His eyes look over to her notepad.

Fred sees a red-headed woman fight off a tall, handsome serial killer who looks an awful lot like him.

FRED

He looks familiar.

He walks over and grabs a mug out of a cabinet.

JADE I'm trying something different.

Fred fills the mug up.

FRED I thought you'd make me the hero.

JADE Colton had an idea and I'm going to see where it goes.

Fred sighs.

JADE (CONT'D) Every hero is always this tall, dark, and impossibly handsome guy. What if he was evil?

FRED I'm not sure if I like being the bad guy in your comic book.

JADE You're the hero in my life.

He takes a sip.

FRED

We've got an opening.

JADE I'm happy where I am.

FRED Our benefits are much better.

JADE It gives me time to draw.

FRED We could have lunch every day instead of when I'm home.

JADE

I kind of like being at the store. It gives me the motivation to finish this and get it out there.

FRED

I can't wait until that's done and everyone in the world wants a copy.

JADE I hope you're right.

Fred takes a sip of coffee.

FRED

Why are you drawing with a pencil? I bought you that tablet to make it easier to do this.

JADE I'm in a funk and I'm trying to draw my way out of it. (looks out the window) I've got to get going.

They lightly kiss.

She leaves.

EXT. RANCH HOME - DAY

The Firebird pulls up.

Jade gets in.

INT. FIREBIRD - DAY (DRIVING)

Colton is behind the wheel.

The car takes off.

Jade looks at the drink holder.

Two coffee cups from a chain are in there.

She grabs one and takes a sip.

COLTON What's the best song for karaoke?

JADE Do I have to ask why?

COLTON

Erika refused to do it last night because they didn't have the exact right song for her.

Jade takes another sip.

JADE

I get that.

COLTON

You'd think between three hundred plus songs she could've found one.

JADE

You're also standing there, all alone, in front of a bunch of people. I can imagine she doesn't want to be the person who goes viral online for being way off-key for an Adele song.

COLTON

I suggested Baby Got Back but she took it as an insult. (beat) I had a couple of drinks in me.

She takes another sip.

COLTON (CONT'D) It's a fun song and people will--

Jade laughs.

JADE

She doesn't have any back, that's what you did wrong!

COLTON It's not like she'd be twerking in a rap video anytime soon, but I out-kicked my coverage on her.

She takes a longer sip.

Silence.

JADE Anytime you spring for the Nitro shot, you need me to fix something.

COLTON I can't be just nice and want to talk about 90s rap bangers.

JADE

Spit it out.

Beat.

COLTON Erika wants to read my script. And probably an agent from CAA, too.

Jade sighs.

JADE It won't get noticed just sitting on your Hard Drive.

COLTON But it's not ready.

JADE What draft are you on?

Colton thinks for a moment.

JADE (CONT'D) That's not good.

JADE (CONT'D) I got some great notes from some people on Reddit the other day that I need to implement.

EXT. STRIP MALL - DAY

Small businesses are all over.

A faded sign for Middle Coast Comics is in the center.

A Sedan is parked near it.

Colton takes his phone out and looks around. He smiles.

COLTON It's New Comic Wednesday!

JADE And your real girlfriend.

COLTON Lenora is a black swan and you should appreciate her more.

JADE There are lots of people in that age bracket who read comic books.

COLTON But not the ones she does.

JADE She indulges you.

COLTON

I can't help it that I have immaculate taste in comics that she leans on to make her choices.

Jade rolls her eyes.

JADE Is Erika jealous of her?

COLTON

Hardly.

JADE You've never missed a Wednesday as long as she's been coming.

COLTON That's purely a coincidence.

Both walk inside.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Jade looks at a calendar.

Today's delivery is crossed off.

Colton walks in.

JADE No delivery today.

COLTON

What about next week?

Jade looks at the calendar.

She flips through several months. Nothing.

JADE He doesn't need one of us if there isn't a delivery.

Colton walks over to Terry's office.

TERRY'S OFFICE

Boxes of older comic books are all over.

A desk has a laptop covered in comic book stickers on it.

A large, framed photo of TERRY (60s) and his wife LISA (60s) is hung on the wall.

Terry has long, graying dreadlocks and thick glasses.

Lisa is short with fiery red hair slowly going gray.

The door opens, revealing Colton.

He looks inside.

COLTON

Terry?

Jade looks inside.

He shrugs.

JADE Maybe he's in the warehouse. Colton and Jade look around.

COLTON

Terry!

Silence.

JADE Where do you think he is?

COLTON Maybe he's having a senior moment.

Jade looks in either direction.

JADE Fred's company has an opening.

COLTON I'm flattered but--

JADE It's for me.

COLTON

Oh.

Jade takes a deep breath.

COLTON (CONT'D) What about Deviant Art? You could draw full-time, commission only.

JADE

The only person who contacted me on that site wanted me to do... things no person should ever draw.

COLTON It couldn't have been that bad.

Jade takes a deep, measured breath.

JADE He wanted me to draw of former President Trump and Hillary Clinton as furries in the middle of what he called a Bunnywaffen orgy. (beat) When I said no the price kept going up until I eventually deleted my whole account. COLTON How much did he want to pay you?

JADE He started at two grand and it just kept going up.

COLTON There comes a point--

JADE My dignity is worth more than that.

COLTON It could've been something to do while you're working here.

JADE I applied at NYC Art.

COLTON

No shit.

JADE I'm still waiting to hear back but I keep thinking what Fred will say. (looks around) I keep thinking about everything that could happen, and I just don't want to know at this point. But I also want to know, too.

COLTON You could give them a call and see if they've made a decision.

JADE Then it becomes real, you know?

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Middle Coast Comic Store Owner TERRY (60s) walks up.

He has long, graying dreadlocks and thick glasses.

Two envelopes are in one hand, a coffee cup holder with three large corporate coffee cups in the other.

The top envelope has "Colton" written on it.

His eyes look inside and around.

He places a "Going Out Of Business" sign on a window.

Terry walks in. All eyes turn to him. Terry places the coffee cup holder on a counter. Colton grabs one with a C on it. He hands one with J written on it to Jade. TERRY I figured coffee should make this a little bit easier. Colton takes a sip of coffee. Terry hands an envelope to him and then Jade. TERRY (CONT'D) I'm closing the store down. COLTON Fuck you. TERRY I'm not joking. Colton opens his envelope. A severance check and a letter of recommendation are in it. COLTON You aren't. Jade looks at her envelope and then opens it. The same things are in hers. Colton sighs. TERRY I know this is shitty timing but we wanted to do right by you guys. (beat) It's a month for every year you've been here, plus the hours you'd have worked for this week. We won't fight you when you file for your unemployment on Monday, too.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Colton looks at his check for a long moment.

TERRY (CONT'D)

We're going to do an impromptu going-out-of-business sale today. I will buy lunch and give you \$200 in cash if you're willing to stay and work for a full shift.

COLTON What about Wayne and Zander?

TERRY Last night was their last day.

Colton and Jade look at each other.

COLTON So what, we just chill here?

TERRY

Everything is going to auction once we close down, so if you want to grab anything that doesn't get sold I'm more than OK with that.

Jade looks around and then to Colton.

JADE

Why?

TERRY It's time... Lisa wants to travel the world and I ran out of ways to tell her no.

COLTON How many comic books?

TERRY Be reasonable.

JADE What's for lunch?

TERRY I'll let you guys pick.

Colton and Jade look at each other.

She gives him a thumbs up.

COLTON Not like I've got anything else to do today. TERRY Wonderful! (beat) I'm going to handle some things in the office. We close at five today.

JADE We'll figure out what's for lunch and yell at you.

Terry nods.

COLTON I always assumed you'd fire me.

TERRY

Me too.

Terry walks into his office.

COLTON So when are you going to tell Fred you want that job?

JADE I have no idea.

Jade walks behind the counter and finds a chair.

COLTON What's the name of his company?

JADE You aren't going to apply.

COLTON Technically I'll be unemployed.

JADE Dreamland might have an opening. That is if you still want to work in comics.

She sits down and opens her notebook back to Vengeance in Red. Jade takes a pencil out and draws.

COLTON Where's your tablet?

JADE Every time I get to a point, I just delete everything. This way I have to finish. Colton looks around.

COLTON Is this working in comics?

JADE It's not as glorious as they make it out to be in the movies.

COLTON Like, what, there's a Road House but for comic book stores?

JADE You should write it.

COLTON

I'm a crime thriller guy, not the kind of guy who writes movies for bouncers to beat off to.

JADE

What?

COLTON You know, like Road House. (thinks for a moment) I could see it.

JADE

Oh, no.

COLTON

Comic Store starring Channing Tatum as Blaze Maverick, a bouncer hired to clean up the roughest comic book depository in Nashville armed with his fists and a doctorate in Quantum Mechanics. (throws a punch)

And don't go come back!

Jade stops and thinks.

JADE

Why would he be throwing someone out of a comic book store?

COLTON

Because he didn't want to knock five bucks off the price of a Green Lantern special edition. JADE Depends on which Green Lantern.

COLTON Hal Jordan, of course.

JADE

Blasphemy.

COLTON Hal Jordan's books are always boring because he's been around since the fifties.

JADE He's the original Lantern!

COLTON But he's not cool.

JADE

When did that become a criterion for being a Lantern?

COLTON

There comes an age where no one can ever be cool and he crossed it. The only person who ever got to that age in life and remained cool was Bowie, of course.

Jade thinks for a moment.

COLTON (CONT'D) He'd have been an awesome Lantern.

JADE What about Dolly Parton?

COLTON I said cool, not popular. (beat) Cool is a vibe, a notion, a thing that is only temporary because tastes change. It's a moment where you are just... that kind of guy.

JADE So wouldn't Bowie have been lame at some point?

COLTON He argued for black stars on MTV and knew them by name. JADE

That's very progressive of him.

COLTON

There isn't a decade of his life where Bowie wasn't cool. Even in The Prestige, where he's a stunt cast for Tesla, he shows up and just kills it because--

JADE

He's cool.

COLTON

Exactly.

She looks up and gives him a thumbs down.

JADE

Weak.

COLTON Still on Vengeance in Red?

Jade nods and resumes drawing.

Colton walks over and looks at it.

COLTON (CONT'D) Why is Fred trying to kill her?

JADE That's not Fred.

COLTON Could've fooled me.

JADE We're at the midway point and now she has to kill the Big Red Bastard.

He tilts his head.

JADE (CONT'D) He thinks the River God Trellnor is telling him to kill women in a ritualistic manner.

Colton shrugs and wanders into the aisles.

He goes through some of the books.

That feels like a final villain.

JADE

Her final confrontation is with the Horse Face Killer, the big bad from the first scene.

COLTON

That could be fun.

JADE

Fred thinks it's a bit much.

COLTON

The Crow was super fucked up and then they made it less so for the movie. This could be that way.

JADE

It has to be good enough so that Margot Robbie would see herself in the lead.

COLTON

The Barbie girl?

JADE

Dye her hair red and she'd be perfect for this.

COLTON

Are you sure she'd even want to take this? Barbie was kind of big.

JADE

Who wouldn't want to be a badass killing serial killers with a sword and all sorts of cool weapons?

Colton places several comic books on top of the box.

JADE (CONT'D)

He said--

COLTON I need these to finish up the Kevin Smith run on Daredevil.

JADE

Maybe you should wait.

He grabs them and puts them behind the counter.

COLTON

It's ten bucks.

She shakes her head.

COLTON (CONT'D) If someone asks, I'll hand them over. Happy?

Jade draws.

JADE Would you mind stopping by the thrift store on the way home?

COLTON Clothes shopping?

JADE I need a reference for the next scene and I love that store.

Colton shrugs.

He looks into the comic boxes.

COLTON What happens, does she buy a bunch of clothes to kill people with?

JADE It's assembling her Scooby Squad, to set things up for the sequel.

COLTON How many of these things do you have in mind?

She thinks for a moment.

COLTON (CONT'D) So far I'm down but the normies might not be, just saying.

JADE

Three. (beat) The first one we meet her, she kills Horse Face, and then she winds up on the run from the FBI. (beat) The second we meet the guy pulling the strings, and she kills him. (MORE) JADE (CONT'D) But she gets caught by the cops and placed in an asylum.

COLTON And what, it's run by an evil doctor or something?

JADE

He's the final bad guy and she has to kill him to complete the circle of everything.

COLTON That sounds old school.

JADE Blockbuster kind of old school.

COLTON I barely remember that place.

JADE

When I was a kid, there was one next to the old Tower Records and three other stores.

COLTON You sound like my dad.

JADE

Do you remember the first time you went to a place like this?

Colton thinks for a moment. He smiles.

JADE (CONT'D)

That feeling is just pure, unbridled magic. Think of how many kids are going to miss out on that because, instead, they're logging onto some app.

COLTON

But think of how much cool stuff is available because of those apps. I can log in and watch every movie in the Criterion collection for like ten bucks a month. That's insane!

JADE

I always thought that I'd have my first signing here, when Vengeance in Red is published and I've got all sorts of badass credits. Terry types on his laptop.

COLTON (0.S.) You know it started with all of those Marvel movies, right?

JADE (O.S.) This again?

COLTON (O.S.) You know I'm right about it.

JADE (O.S.)

Seriously?

He sighs.

Terry closes the door.

He walks back to his laptop.

Terry's fingers type on it for a moment.

His eyes focus on it.

MAIN STORE

Colton places a handful of comic books on the counter.

Jade looks at them and groans.

JADE Daredevil is one thing but--

COLTON I bought these from someone my first week here.

JADE And you make fun of me for having a dose of nostalgia.

COLTON They're good books, too.

She places them on top of the other books.

JADE The MCU did so much for comic books that you're overlooking. COLTON For older comics.

JADE People still come here.

COLTON Terry told me about how people used to have monthly pull lists.

JADE They still do.

COLTON But those are 1 or 2 books. I'm talking like ten.

JADE That's a lot.

COLTON The more people saw Marvel movies, the less they came here.

JADE The movies were good, at least.

COLTON

Seriously?

She shakes her head and resumes drawing.

COLTON (CONT'D) The scripts have to be Mad Libs at this point.

JADE Did we watch the same movies?

Colton wanders back to the comic aisles.

COLTON

The first Avengers film was two hours of boredom, bad jokes, and then forty minutes of just straight green screen action and CGI.

JADE That's called plot development.

COLTON Or two hours of my life I'll never get back. JADE

Joss Whedon doesn't make movies anymore, for what it's worth.

COLTON That's what makes it worse!

JADE

Are you a secret Buffy fan or--

COLTON

Every Marvel film after that was just tense dramatic moment ruined with just five minutes straight of bad one-liners.

JADE That's overselling it.

COLTON

Guardians 3 has this great moment between Quill and Gamora where he talks to her about who she was. And then she points out that's not her. It's great and poignant... and then it's a five-minute stretch of bad jokes that just completely ruin it.

JADE

It wasn't--

COLTON The only thing missing was a giant fart joke, to accentuate it.

Colton takes out several comics and looks at them.

He places one on the box.

COLTON (CONT'D) Film one: The hero fights a villain with all of the same powers, (beat) Film two: A revelation that the past isn't what we assume it was. (beat) Film three: abrupt tone shift.

She stops and thinks.

JADE You say all this and yet.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

An ANNOYING CUSTOMER walks by. His eyes spot the "Going Out of Business" sign. He walks inside.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

The Customer walks into the aisle.

Colton walks back to the counter.

COLTON I'd never write a Marvel movie.

JADE It's a job everyone would kill to do, don't lie to me.

COLTON It's a shitty job.

The Customer goes through several comic book boxes.

JADE If Kevin Feige walked in that door and said he wants you to do the fourth Guardians film, you can't stand there and tell me you would not take it.

Colton thinks for a moment.

JADE (CONT'D)

Liar!

COLTON

What?

JADE You know you'd take the phat bag and run to the bank.

COLTON It'd be a difficult decision.

JADE That's such bullshit. COLTON And if someone wanted you to draw some cape shit, would you?

JADE I'd have to think about it.

COLTON Double bullshit.

JADE I'm more of an indie comic type but if it's a good rate, I'd have to at least consider it.

The Customer spots a comic book.

He takes out his phone and searches for it on the internet. The Customer looks at the price and then his phone.

> ANNOYING CUSTOMER This is three dollars at Dreamland.

Jade and Colton look over.

The Customer holds up the comic book.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER (CONT'D) Why is it so much more expensive?

COLTON Dreamland's is in worse shape.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER How do you know?

COLTON They undercut the price because they can't match on quality.

Jade glares at him.

JADE (hushed) Terry says we're supposed to--

COLTON (hushed) It's three bucks.

She sighs and resumes drawing.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER Would you guys price-match them?

COLTON We don't price match from internet listings, sorry.

The Customer puts the comic back.

JADE

Cape shit?

COLTON

Ok, like someone offers you the chance to draw the Teenage Avengers for whatever the going page rate is at the time.

The Customer goes through some more comic books.

JADE

If I could pay the rent by drawing a comic book instead of here, well, that's the dream, right?

COLTON Even for the indie comic type?

JADE

A year or two of drawing at Marvel probably sets me up to write on my own, crowdfund it, and--

COLTON

It's like being the guy who wrote Morbius. I mean yeah, it got made, but do you want to be the guy who wrote Morbius?

JADE

What sort of house do you think the check from Morbius bought him?

The Customer takes a comic book out.

He pulls it up on his phone and compares the price.

It's more expensive here.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER This one is ten dollars more here.

Jade looks up.

JADE

Let's see.

The Customer shows it to Jade.

COLTON That's the alternate cover.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER It's the same comic book inside.

COLTON

But not the same cover.

The Customer puts it back and searches through the box.

COLTON (CONT'D) Filmmaking is a collaborative to do but the script is where it starts!

JADE

It's not like it's all his fault. He could be banking those checks so when he makes a preachy art house film, guys like you would be-- (mocking Colton's voice) --Oh my God, what a great film!

COLTON You do my voice wrong.

JADE I do it perfectly.

The Customer pulls out a comic book.

He looks at it.

A female superhero poses provocatively on the cover.

COLTON That's more Shane Gillis.

JADE

I do your voice perfectly, you just hate that you're wrong on this one.

He takes out his phone and searches for it on the internet. The Customer looks at the price and then his phone.

> ANNOYING CUSTOMER This one is like double the price.

Jade and Colton look over.

The Customer shows them the comic book.

COLTON It's probably the only one that doesn't have semen on it.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER Excuse me?

COLTON

That's from before the web was a thing. I bet your average thirteenyear-old looked at that and just shot some of his web-fluid all over that thirst trap of a comic book.

Jade puts her hands over her face.

COLTON (CONT'D) I'm curious how many comic books are still in circulation because of Porn Hub's existence.

ANNOYING CUSTOMER I'm never coming back here.

The Customer walks out.

Colton waves bye to him as he does.

JADE What the fuck is wrong with you?

COLTON Is this a real question or--

Jade looks around.

JADE

Terry!

Silence.

COLTON (mocking her voice) Terry!

JADE I'm in the right here!

COLTON You know he agrees with me. JADE

I highly doubt that.

COLTON It's why he's never fired me.

JADE

I assumed it was because you had pictures of him with something.

COLTON

So I'm not exactly employee of the month but--

JADE

I bet you couldn't make it through ten seconds without being a jerk to some customer.

COLTON

Oh, please.

JADE

Want to bet?

COLTON

No.

JADE I bet the next customer who walks in will walk out because of some awful thing you say.

COLTON I still don't like the implicati

I still don't like the implication of this bet.

JADE That you can't be nice for a moment of your life?

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

A red SUV parks.

NANCY (30s) exits and walks in.

She's short and thin with a Karen-style haircut.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Colton grabs the Annoying Customer's pile of comic books and places them back in the box.

COLTON That guy is the sort of person who makes working here the worst.

Jade resumes drawing.

COLTON (CONT'D) In the end, I saved us some time that he would've wasted.

JADE Or you were being a dick.

COLTON Either way, right?

Jade sighs.

Nancy walks in and looks around.

NANCY Do you guys happen to have a feminist section, by chance?

Colton and Jade turn to her.

COLTON Are you looking for something specific or is it more--

NANCY

It's for my daughter. She's getting into comic books and I want to get her something for her birthday.

COLTON How old is she?

Nancy looks around.

NANCY Twelve going on middle-aged.

Colton looks to Jade.

JADE I was into the X-Men at that age. NANCY She said she doesn't want anything with a superhero in it.

Colton looks around.

COLTON Anything else?

NANCY She said it has to--(takes phone out, looks at a list) --pass the Bechdel test.

Jade glares at Colton.

COLTON Yeah, you don't want to do that.

NANCY

Why not?

Colton walks over to the far side of the aisle.

He goes through several books and takes one out.

It has an explicit sex scene on the cover.

The women recoil.

Colton puts it back.

COLTON This passes the Bechdel test.

NANCY That's pornography.

COLTON Blaze Comics calls it for mature readers only but I'd agree with you on it.

Nancy shakes her head.

NANCY I know it's just a phase but--

COLTON I have an idea.

Jade takes a deep breath.

Her eyes look to Terry's office.

Colton wanders over to a different portion of the aisle.

He quickly searches and pulls out a comic book.

He shows it to Nancy.

Her eyes focus on it.

It features a female Conan the Barbarian-type hero killing hordes of monsters.

NANCY That feels a bit like a superhero comic book.

COLTON It's from Shadow Scribe Comics, which is an indie label that does all sorts of cool shit like this.

NANCY Does it pass that test?

COLTON That test is not what your daughter thinks it is.

NANCY I Googled it but--

COLTON Bikini Car Wash passes it.

Nancy looks at him oddly.

COLTON (CONT'D)

Yeah.

NANCY She's trying to be a feminist and it's her whole... thing... now.

COLTON

She wants badass, empowered heroes but doesn't want to be pandered to. Most of what passes the Bechdel Test is going to just pander to her and that's not what she's asking for, either.

Nancy nods.

Colton points to the cover.

COLTON (CONT'D) Sumatra is based off this legendary Viking Queen named Lagertha. She was this absolute force of nature.

Nancy looks at the cover.

COLTON (CONT'D) It's a fifteen-issue run. The writer wanted this to be his Conan, the Robert E. Howard version.

Colton goes through the box.

Jade watches him closely.

He pulls out five more issues of the same comic book series.

COLTON (CONT'D) We've got the first six, which is the entire Coven Dragon arc. Anyone who reads the series tends to stop there because it just can't be topped, hence why the series petered out after fifteen issues. (beat) We're going out of business and these have been here for a couple of years. I'll do all of them for the cost of the first.

Nancy looks around.

NANCY Are you sure?

COLTON Your daughter will adore this.

Nancy takes a deep breath and nods.

Colton walks to the counter and quickly rings her up.

Nancy hands him some cash.

NANCY Both of the guys at Dreamland weren't this friendly. COLTON

They've got more Funko Pops on their shelves than comic books for a reason.

Nancy walks out.

Jade watches her closely.

JADE Now why can't you be that way with every customer?

COLTON

She was nice.

JADE

And the other guy was what?

COLTON

She came in here looking to make a connection to her kid. That takes a lot of guts. He was a scavenger. I can respect someone trying to bond with their kid but that guy? Fuck him and the horse he rode in on.

JADE Terry is going to be pissed you gave her that discount.

Both look to Terry's office.

COLTON

Terry?

Terry walks out.

TERRY (to Colton) What'd you say this time?

COLTON Why is it always that?

Terry sighs.

TERRY I was thinking of that new joint on Third Street. Longmore Barbecue.

COLTON I could go for it.

39.

JADE How's their cornbread?

TERRY

Why?

JADE Cornbread at a barbecue joint is like sweet and sour chicken at a Chinese place. If they can fuck that up, the rest of their food is going to be awful.

TERRY

Noted. (beat) Any suggestions?

COLTON Ask if their spicy BBQ is spicy or just white girl spicy.

Terry walks back into his office.

The door closes.

Jade spots a TV.

She walks over and turns on a modern superhero movie.

Colton's phone buzzes.

He looks at it.

Colton has an email from "Samantha Worthington - CAA."

The subject line reads "Script / Meeting."

Colton mouths "holy shit."

He looks up and spots the TV.

JADE I'm not changing it to whatever bad indie film you want to watch,

COLTON I was hoping for Roger Corman's Fantastic Four.

Colton wanders behind the counter.

JADE Seriously? It's historical and--

JADE It was never meant to be watched.

COLTON Which is what makes it so much better than it should be.

JADE

You complain about whoring and that is the ultimate whore job.

Colton yawns.

COLTON

That he went YOLO and made a ton of choices because he was being equal amounts of cheap and auteur make it so fascinating.

JADE

That's fascinating and yet the entire MCU is boring.

COLTON He took risks, at least.

JADE None of them paid off.

COLTON

But they went for it! The MCU is all sanitized and boring because they don't want to risk being bad.

JADE

They are good movies, for the most part, you know.

COLTON

I want to see a film take a risk and just lay it out there, like The Rocketeer, instead of one more generic loser in tights with superpowers saving the day. (beat) It's why I can watch a film like Super, or Defendor, or Sky High... those films took risks an MCU film would never touch.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

The Luxury Sedan parks.

Fred gets out.

A large FedEx Envelope package is in his hands.

He walks inside.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Jade sighs.

JADE None of those are that good.

COLTON But they tried, and that's the most important thing, at least to me.

A bell rings.

Jade and Colton turn to see Fred walking in.

A FedEx folder is in his hands.

Fred hands it to Jade.

It's already opened.

FRED When were you going to tell me?

Jade turns to Fred.

Colton looks around.

COLTON I'm going to take a smoke break.

Colton walks out.

Jade looks inside and pulls out an acceptance letter. She skims it.

> JADE Full acceptance and a scholarship!

FRED In New York.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS, DOCKS - DAY

Colton smokes.

His phone buzzes with a text from Erika.

"How's work going, baby?"

Colton texts her back: "Makes me wish I was back in bed with you, no lie. And tomorrow I'll have lots of time for that."

Erika responds: ":-)"

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Jade and Fred look at each other.

JADE

I don't see--

FRED We never talked about this.

JADE I didn't think they'd even let me in, to be fair. (beat) And why are you opening my stuff?

FRED

I thought it was your mom's thing and wanted to be sure.

JADE And you had to come here and confront me about this?

FRED As far as I knew you were just drawing for fun--

JADE I'm actively querying on this.

FRED Has anyone said yes?

JADE I've gotten viewed, at least.

FRED And what would art school do? JADE Open more doors and allow me to draw full-time instead of just here and there.

FRED It's in New York.

JADE We can make this work.

FRED What about AI? I saw this video on Twitter today. A guy made this cool trailer for a movie.

JADE No self-respecting artist would--

FRED

It made me think that I could do it. There'll probably be one for comic books next. I hate to say it but you might be spending four years trying to do a job that might be gone sooner than you think.

JADE You are unbelievable!

Fred looks away.

He takes a deep breath.

Jade looks around.

FRED I just don't want you to get hurt.

JADE I haven't even decided if I'm going to take it yet!

Fred looks around.

FRED Just let me know, I guess.

Fred walks out.

Jade sits down behind the counter, crying.

Colton walks in and over to the counter.

BEHIND THE COUNTER

Colton sits down and takes a deep breath.

Jade sobs.

He taps her on the shoulder.

JADE He couldn't even be happy for me.

COLTON If you need to take a minute--

She wipes the tears from her eyes.

JADE I'll be fine.

Colton reaches over and grabs her hand. Jade squeezes it.

> COLTON He's not for it, I gather.

JADE What do you think?

COLTON How much is out-of-pocket for you?

JADE I got a full ride, plus board. (beat) And a twenty-thousand dollar stipend, too.

COLTON Is it guaranteed?

JADE Just for a year.

COLTON They're overlooking the fact that you're an ugly crier.

Jade lets go of Colton's hand.

She smacks him playfully.

COLTON (CONT'D) The truth is supposed to hurt you, not me!

Colton laughs.

She playfully smacks him again.

COLTON (CONT'D) I'm not the first guy you should rush to when people have emotional issues to talk about.

JADE What happens when Erika cries?

COLTON God had a sense of irony putting a woman who's very sensitive with--

JADE

An asshole.

They look at each other for a moment.

He nods.

COLTON

I would say that I'm occasionally insensitive but... that's fair.

JADE How are we friends?

COLTON Spend enough time with someone over the years and it happens.

Beat.

JADE

He didn't say it directly but I'm getting the feeling it's a "him or me" sort of conversation.

COLTON What are you going to do?

JADE

I don't know.

COLTON At least you have a choice. JADE

You quit film school.

COLTON Technically, I flunked out.

JADE Were you just not into it or--

COLTON

My first screenwriting course had this guy in it who refused to do a writing assignment for group because it involved a gun and he couldn't give himself permission to do so. And he said it in the most crybaby way, too.

JADE

You sound like a gym teacher.

COLTON

He was saying it because he wanted to be the sensitive artist around the girls and it's just the most chickenshit way possible. Even the teachers bought into it. I tuned out like ten seconds after that.

JADE

You gave that up for here, too.

COLTON

My first job after film school was working in construction. This is way more fun than that ever was.

JADE If you could do it again--

COLTON I don't know what I'd do.

She thinks for a long moment.

COLTON (CONT'D) Plus there's the fun of dating.

JADE How many Erikas are out there? Because there isn't another Fred. COLTON She's the only who has ever passed the Muppet test.

JADE Which one is your favorite or what?

COLTON

Ok, you're allowed to remake one movie with every single character but one being played by a Muppet. Which film do you choose and who's the only human?

Jade sighs.

COLTON (CONT'D) Mine is Con Air and Nicolas Cage.

JADE

No way.

COLTON Oh come on, Fozzy Bear as Garland Greene would be the best! (Fozzy the Bear imitating Steve Buscemi) One girl... I drove through three states wearing her head as a hat. (makes wild hand gestures) Wocka Wocka!

JADE What was her choice?

COLTON Pride and Prejudice.

JADE That's a weird choice.

COLTON

Erika wanted the version with Kiera Knightley in it because she is a huge fan of Donald Sutherland.

JADE

The fact that she didn't just walk out says a lot.

Beat.

COLTON Her kid hates me. (beat) I asked for his permission to marry her and he told me no.

She looks at him for a long moment.

JADE He probably thinks you want to replace his old man.

COLTON Zach said David is his father and I'm just the guy fucking his mom.

Jade laughs.

JADE I know I shouldn't but--

COLTON If it was anyone else, I would too.

JADE He'll come around.

COLTON David likes me, too, which makes this all super hard.

JADE If she loves you, that's all you need right?

COLTON You don't date a woman with kids, you audition to see if you're ready for a family.

JADE

And?

COLTON She's my Mary Jane Watson. (beat) My Earth-616 Mary Jane, the best one there is.

The front door opens.

MAIN STORE

Colton stands up.

Regular customers MIKE and SCOTT (both 20s) walk in and walk into the aisles.

Mike is tall with a dad bod.

Scott is short and hulking.

Both are film school friends of Colton and are dressed in brand-new dress shirts with matching ties.

COLTON What's up, shit sniffers?

MIKE We saw the sign.

COLTON It doesn't mean you get to snap your fingers, Thanos.

SCOTT Why the fuck not?

COLTON Please show this place some dignity in its final days.

MIKE If I was I'd ask if you guys still had Wolverine number one around.

COLTON We put that up on eBay.

Jade stands up.

JADE Someone spent ten grand on that.

SCOTT

Bull shit!

COLTON

It was right after Infinity War. The first one fell through but a week ago someone paid full freight.

MIKE More like Infinity Bore. JADE

I'm not dealing with this.

She leaves.

SCOTT Is she still justifying Iron Man 3?

Colton shrugs.

MIKE It's kind of nice to see a woman who doesn't look like an alien.

COLTON

Pardon?

SCOTT

Every woman in Los Angeles has that weird look where there's no fat on their face.

MIKE

I had a theory about it that he thinks is crazy.

COLTON This ought to be good.

SCOTT

It is crazy.

MIKE

I'm thinking that all of the plastic surgeons out there are all secretly aliens and they're preparing us for first contact by changing famous women to look like how the aliens look.

Colton thinks for a moment.

COLTON That is crazy but it would make an amazing comic book.

SCOTT I'd adapt it to the movie.

COLTON If you're going to do that, at least bold your slug lines.

Scott takes out a comic book and looks at the price.

\$50.

He shows it to Colton.

COLTON (CONT'D)

Fifty bucks.

SCOTT Going out of business and--

COLTON It's worth \$50.

MIKE

Forty.

COLTON This isn't Dreamland. (beat) Don't make me point out all thirty ways that book is priced the way it is, Scott.

SCOTT Seems ten dollars too much.

COLTON The backing board alone is worth the cost of admission.

MIKE Gil says hi.

Colton yawns.

COLTON I spoke to him this morning.

SCOTT He called you his script whisperer.

COLTON You guys would've given him the same notes.

SCOTT Your notes on our pilot got us a general with a guy we can't say.

COLTON Congratulations. SCOTT They have our Script Rev but we wanted to wow them.

COLTON So you're bringing in a special comic book?

SCOTT We need something obscure, you know, like The Sculptor.

COLTON The Sculptor wasn't obscure, it was just indie.

MIKE We need something like that as our backup plan.

Colton thinks for a moment.

COLTON

Milk and Cheese.

They look at him oddly.

COLTON (CONT'D)

It was a comic that had a tiny run out of Wisconsin for almost like twenty years. We've got the series.

SCOTT

What's it about?

COLTON

A carton of milk and a head of cheese get into all sorts of fucked up adventures.

Scott shakes his head.

COLTON (CONT'D) It'd be the Invincible for a more discerning set.

MIKE No one's taking that sort of risk.

Colton sighs.

COLTON Garth Ennis's Crossed.

MIKE

More mainstream accessible.

Colton looks around.

He walks over to a box and pulls out a spy comic.

COLTON Jimmy's Bastards could do it.

Mike and Scott perk up.

SCOTT Pitch me on it.

COLTON

A British secret agent has to fight his bastard kids to save the world. Basically, if James Bond never used a rubber with a lot of Catholic women and then had a small army of kids with daddy issues and nukes.

The Customer looks at Colton.

COLTON (CONT'D) It's a great book.

MIKE I'm not seeing the comps.

COLTON The Kingsman meets Delivery Man.

Scott and Mike think.

MIKE I'd watch that movie.

SCOTT

Me too.

Colton looks at Mike.

MIKE

How much?

Colton looks at the cover.

COLTON Twenty-five is fair.

Both men place cash on the counter.

Colton rings them up.

SCOTT If you're ever out west--COLTON I'll let you know.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

A GENERIC CUSTOMER walks up.

He looks at the "Going out of Business" sign.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Scott and Mike leave.

Terry walks in and looks around.

TERRY Where's your partner in crime?

COLTON Having... woman... issues.

TERRY Like physical ones or--

COLTON She was crying and you know how that goes, right?

Terry sighs.

COLTON (CONT'D) I grew up with four sisters and it was nothing but that shit.

TERRY I thought that'd make you more, how do I put it, sympathetic.

COLTON Jade's a little, you know, screwy but my sisters were legit nutters.

Terry looks around.

TERRY Please tell me-- COLTON Fred started it, not me.

TERRY Are you sure about that?

COLTON How is everything my fault?

TERRY It usually starts with something you said and then it gets worse from there.

Colton thinks.

COLTON Fair enough.

The Generic Customer walks in and looks around.

GENERIC CUSTOMER Can I use your bathroom?

Terry points to the bathroom.

TERRY You got to jiggle the handle.

The Generic Customer walks into the bathroom.

COLTON How come you never got that fixed?

TERRY I did... twice.

COLTON Could've fooled me.

TERRY There comes a point where sometimes things are meant to be the way they are, I suppose.

Terry motions around.

COLTON It's been pretty slow today.

TERRY What are you going to do tomorrow?

Colton shrugs.

TERRY (CONT'D) Three years here and--(mocks Colton's shrug) --that's it? COLTON What'd you expect? TERRY More than that. COLTON It's not like I'm going to turn into Buff Bagwell and man-whore it up for money. TERRY Wait... what? COLTON I thought you were a wrestling guy. TERRY Buff Bagwell was a sex worker? COLTON I was super baked one night and turned the TV on to this reality show called "Gigolos."

TERRY

Oh no.

COLTON He was like a star on it as this dude who plows women for money.

Terry looks around and takes a deep breath.

COLTON (CONT'D) That's how you know it's bullshit.

TERRY It's a reality TV show.

COLTON And he was being paid by all of these tens to sex them up.

TERRY I have a hard time believing that this is all real. COLTON Google that shit if you need to.

TERRY If you're going to do that, you should make sure to get paid first.

COLTON I kept thinking that hell for him is a pro wrestling fan, right?

TERRY

Oh no.

COLTON (mock female voice) Buff, show me your stuff!

TERRY I hope you didn't spend days coming up with that.

COLTON Just an hour or so.

TERRY That's... an improvement.

COLTON Bored in the office?

TERRY Shutting everything down is a little depressing.

Terry wanders into the aisles.

COLTON Are you taking anything out of here or is it all to the auction?

Terry takes out a comic book and looks at it for a moment.

TERRY My collection is at home.

COLTON That's... good.

Terry puts it down.

TERRY Six months ago I got a complaint about you. What'd I say?

TERRY It was something you wrote on Reddit, I believe.

Colton curses under his breath.

COLTON That's supposed to be anonymous.

TERRY It had a link to your writing in it. I was impressed.

COLTON

I don't know how I'm supposed to feel about you reading something that I wrote.

TERRY

It made me question why you're still here and not doing it for a living, Colton.

COLTON I haven't gotten a sign that I need to do something with my life.

TERRY It's not the Bat symbol.

COLTON How'd it happen to you?

TERRY A light just went off in my head and here I am.

COLTON Then I guess I'm just waiting for that light to turn on for me.

TERRY

Don't wait too long.

The Generic Customer walks in and into the aisle.

Colton watches him.

Terry walks back into his office.

The Customer takes out a comic book from a box.

He shows it to Colton.

Colton's eyes are focused on his phone.

GENERIC CUSTOMER

Is this--

COLTON

Probably.

The Customer Shrugs and puts it back.

His phone buzzes with a photo.

It's a pair of lace red panties on the floor.

The Customer takes out a comic book from a box.

He shows it to Colton.

Colton's eyes are focused on his phone.

GENERIC CUSTOMER Is this--

COLTON Sure, whatever.

Erika texts him: "What are you waiting for?"

He looks around.

The Customer takes out a comic book from a box. He shows it to Colton.

Colton's eyes are focused on his phone.

COLTON (CONT'D) It's a comic book, OK?

Colton texts her: "Give me like five minutes." The Customer shrugs and leaves. Jade walks in.

> COLTON (CONT'D) I need an hour.

Colton sprints out.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

A truck pulls up.

Colton sprints outside and towards his Firebird. A DELIVERY DRIVER exits his sedan with several bags of food. He walks inside.

Colton's Firebird takes off.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Jade takes her phone out.

She pulls up Fred on her speed dial.

Her finger lingers over "Dial."

Terry walks in.

Jade looks up and spots the Driver walking in.

Terry motions to him.

The Driver places the food on the counter and leaves. Jade opens a bag and pulls out a piece of cornbread.

> TERRY Now for the big test.

She takes a bite. It's delicious.

JADE It's so worth it.

Terry reaches inside and takes out several takeout boxes.

Jade opens another bag.

Five drinks are inside.

She takes them and places them on the counter.

TERRY They gave us too many drinks.

The two eat.

She stops for a moment.

JADE I need some advice.

TERRY Don't leave your boyfriend for that chuckle fuck.

Jade laughs.

JADE That's... not it.

TERRY Thank Christ.

JADE I thought you liked Colton.

TERRY

I do it's just... he'd out-kick his coverage with you, just saying.

JADE I don't know how to interpret me wanting advice and that's the first place you go.

TERRY Whenever my daughter needs to talk, it's always about a boy.

Terry takes a bite.

JADE So I got an offer to go to art school in New York.

TERRY That's amazing!

JADE Fred doesn't think so.

TERRY What does he want you to do?

JADE Get a job at his company and probably become a baby machine.

TERRY You can do that any time you want. JADE It's not that simple.

TERRY

It is.

JADE We live together, we've spent so much time and--

TERRY I wish I could be your age again.

JADE Because you could eliminate all of your mistakes?

TERRY

It's your mistakes that make you who you are. I'd just want the chance to make them all again.

She takes a bite of her food.

JADE That's... not what I was expecting.

TERRY

I know you're supposed to say I wish I could do things all over, and I'd do them differently, but my girls are my life. I wouldn't want to do it again without them.

Jade looks around.

JADE

I always thought I'd come back here and showcase my first comic.

TERRY Do you know what I wanted to be when I was your age?

She shrugs.

TERRY (CONT'D) A film projector.

JADE That's unexpected.

TERRY

You get to watch movies all day and you're there to make sure they don't get fouled up. We called it the show because it was an event. All of my heroes were up there, on the silver screen.

JADE I don't remember the last time I went to see a movie in the theater.

TERRY Everything's digital now so that job is long gone.

Silence.

JADE So I should do this, right?

TERRY If that's what you want.

JADE I need an old man's advice.

TERRY Way to make me feel appreciated.

JADE I just don't know what to do.

Terry thinks for a moment.

TERRY Do you think they'll offer it to you again?

JADE Probably not.

TERRY Let's say you take it. What's the worst possible that happens?

Jade thinks.

JADE

I'd be thirty and looking to take a real job because I couldn't hack it as a comic book artist.

TERRY But what a story, right?

JADE Even if it ends badly?

TERRY Everyone looked at me like I was a crazy man for opening this place.

JADE What was your plan back then?

TERRY Set up the shop and pray a customer or two comes in.

EXT. TOWNHOUSE - DAY

An older SUV is parked in the distance.

Colton's Firebird parks in the driveway.

He knocks on the door.

Nothing.

Colton touches it.

The door opens up.

INT. LIVING ROOM - DAY

Colton walks in.

COLTON

Erika?

The sounds of passionate sex pierce the air and then stop. After a moment, Erika walks out in a bathrobe.

> ERIKA Honey, you're... here.

COLTON I got your text.

Colton looks around.

ERIKA What text? He spots a pair of men's shoes in the kitchen.

COLTON

The picture?

A trail of men's clothing leads to her bedroom.

ERIKA

Oh, right, the picture.

COLTON (yelling, at her bedroom) Hey David!

DAVID (O.S.) Sorry, man.

COLTON It's not you.

DAVID (0.S.) For what it's worth, your notes were amazing. I queried a producer with the new draft and we've got a Zoom meeting set up.

COLTON That's good.

Erika curses under her breath.

COLTON (CONT'D)

Him?

ERIKA We've got Zach and--

COLTON

I get that.

ERIKA I was texting both of you and--

COLTON How many times?

DAVID (O.S.)

A lot!

Beat.

COLTON Please don't, David. DAVID (O.S.) Just trying to help!

ERIKA It's not working.

COLTON And instead of being an adult, you had to get closure by fucking him?

ERIKA I know this looks bad but---

COLTON

Looks bad?

ERIKA It's hard being a single mom!

COLTON That's still not an excuse.

ERIKA What do you want me to say?

COLTON It doesn't matter anymore.

Colton leaves.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Terry and Jade eat.

JADE

What if I get there and fuck it up? What if I go to art school and it isn't what I think it is? I could have torched everything with Fred and be back here, working some job I hate, when I could've been with him and worked a job I hate.

TERRY Or it could be everything you want in life, if only for a moment.

JADE Moments are just that.

TERRY

Take it from someone who has more of their moments in the rearview of life than in front of me. You don't get too many opportunities to chase a dream. After a while, I couldn't chase anything because I had kids and a mortgage. It'll happen to you, too, because life happens while you're making plans.

Colton walks in.

He goes behind the counter and sits down.

Terry looks over.

Tears are streaming down Colton's face.

TERRY (CONT'D) You can handle him.

Terry goes back into his office.

Jade sits down next to Colton.

BEHIND THE COUNTER

Colton looks into the distance.

Jade taps him on the shoulder.

COLTON I don't want to talk about it.

JADE

Noted.

Silence.

He looks up and spots the food.

COLTON He couldn't even ask how I was doing, you know?

JADE Most times you're discussing horrible shit with awful people.

COLTON One of whom is you. Beat.

JADE

Her?

Colton nods.

JADE (CONT'D) Do I want to know?

COLTON She was with her ex.

JADE I don't know what to say.

COLTON I thought she was the one.

Jade thinks for a moment.

JADE Did you think this place was the only place you'd ever work at?

COLTON Her, here... it's what I do. (beat) Life's easy because I know how to handle everything in it.

JADE Is that what Fred wants from me? To be his purpose?

COLTON You are his purpose.

JADE How do you figure?

She stands up.

He follows her, wiping his tears.

MAIN STORE

Jade walks into the aisles, looking at books.

Colton follows her.

COLTON He's old. JADE

So?

COLTON So he's thinking kids, fatherhood, all of that... with you.

JADE And here I am saying fuck that.

Jade takes three comic books out and places them on the box.

COLTON He's got a song, right?

JADE

Huh?

COLTON

For karaoke!

JADE

I guess.

Jade takes out a comic book.

She looks at it for a moment.

COLTON

OK, Fred goes up to the DJ and picks a song on karaoke night.

JADE It wouldn't be something hip.

COLTON What's your best guess?

JADE His car is still tuned to the factory presets.

COLTON So he's the kind of guy who picks Don't Stop Believin' by Journey and it's completely unironic.

She thinks for a moment.

JADE Tubthumping by Chumbawumba.

Colton thinks for a moment.

COLTON

It's going to be stuck in my ear for the next month.

JADE And it's the song he'd pick, I guarantee it.

COLTON

You guys have a good thing and he probably doesn't want to go through all the bullshit. Like right now, he knows the Konami code for you. If this is Contra--

JADE Please don't discuss my sex life like it's a video game.

COLTON He knows where your spread gun is.

JADE

Jesus Christ.

COLTON How many people would know which song he'd pick?

JADE He was married before me.

COLTON

That Fred is willing to put it out there again, for you, says a lot.

Colton spots the food and walks over to it.

JADE

I need some air.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Professional screenwriter KENT (20s) walks in.

Kent is short and thin with a pencil-thin mustache. He's one of Colton's former college buddies.

A tailored suit clings to him.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Jade exits through the rear exit.

Kent walks in.

He and Colton catch eyes.

KENT This is a shock.

COLTON What are you doing here?

Kent walks up to the counter.

KENT I'm looking for Terry, I think.

COLTON I can grab him. Doing research or--

Kent takes his phone out and shows Colton an email. A winning bid for "Wolverine #1" is up on it.

> KENT I was out here for a show and thought I'd pick it up.

Colton looks under the counter.

He spots a locked cabinet.

The keys are in it.

COLTON Terry must be losing his mind.

Colton unlocks the cabinet and takes out Wolverine #1.

A small folder of paperwork is under it.

Colton grabs that and places both on the counter.

Kent opens the folder up.

Paperwork to accept the comic book is in there.

KENT My mother is pissed I bought this.

COLTON Just had to have it?

Colton hands Kent a pen. Kent goes through the paperwork. KENT I made my first big sale and I always said I'd buy something big with it. COLTON This is pretty big. Kent signs it. He hands the pen back. Colton looks at Kent's signatures and signs. KENT So I get it or now--COLTON Did you pay on eBay? KENT I don't think I did. Colton grabs a laptop and pulls up the store's eBay account. He pulls up Kent's order. "Collect Payment" is highlighted. COLTON We can do it there. Colton presses it. Kent's phone buzzes with an email. Kent pulls it up. A payment notice comes up. He opens it up. KENT And on me. Kent presses a button. Colton looks at the laptop. "Payment completed" comes up.

Colton hands him the comic book.

KENT (CONT'D) I figured this would be reversed, based on film school. COLTON You made it through, at least. KENT I went on Linked In the other day and it's like five of us from that screenwriting class are full-time working professionals. COLTON That's... good. KENT Are you still writing? COLTON You know how it goes, right? KENT If you're ever in town--COLTON I'll say hi. Kent exits. Jade walks in. JADE Who was that? COLTON The Wolverine guy. JADE Who'd spend 10 grand on that? COLTON Mister Permission. She shrugs. JADE I guess he gave himself permission to buy that. Good for him, right? COLTON Fuck him.

Jade walks into the aisles.

She takes out several comic books.

JADE Don't be bitter.

COLTON I'm just surprised he was nice to me about it.

JADE You are an acquired taste.

COLTON I referred to him as Cunt and told him it was my accent.

Jade takes out a comic and shows it to Colton. He gives her a thumbs down.

> JADE He must be doing well.

Jade takes out a comic and shows it to Colton.

He gives her a thumbs up.

She places it on a pile.

JADE (CONT'D) Maybe he's the type that is very comfortable writing Morbius.

COLTON It's his fault I got tossed out of film school.

JADE This ought to be balanced.

Jade takes out a comic and shows it to Colton. He gives her a thumbs down.

> COLTON There was a short film competition we all were a part of. You pair up with someone in the directing class, grab some actors, and then make something in 48 hours.

JADE

And what, his short film was better than yours?

COLTON They won because they horse traded for it, not because they made the best film.

JADE How do you do that?

COLTON

It was a jury of your peers, so you had to vote for the best without voting for yourself. That's a semireasonable way to do it, I suppose.

JADE

And what, he got everyone to vote for him?

COLTON

They all appeared on each other's blogs and podcasts to talk about their short films. It became about who could give you content and--

JADE It's a short film contest.

COLTON

It should've been about who made the best piece, period, and nothing else should matter.

Jade takes out a comic and shows it to Colton.

He gives her a thumbs down.

JADE

You should've seen the portfolios of some of the people I know who got in.

COLTON Didn't that piss you off?

JADE Most success is that sort of bullshit horse-trading.

COLTON

It shouldn't be.

Jade takes out a comic and shows it to Colton.

He gives her a thumbs down.

JADE This is a great comic.

COLTON It's got a couple of great panels.

She places it on her pile.

JADE I got my rejection the same week my mom got diagnosed. I wouldn't have gone, either way. Life finds a way of letting you know.

COLTON Why'd you apply again?

JADE Do I need a reason?

COLTON I assumed you were OK with how things were right now.

She thinks for a long moment.

JADE

I had to know if I was good enough.

COLTON

I see your work all the time and--

JADE And you'll always tell me I'm great no matter what.

COLTON

I'm a fan.

JADE

It's one thing for you to like it but... I just wanted to know if I was good enough for them. I hadn't even thought about going there until they gave me that offer.

COLTON

So you were going to what, turn them down or something?

JADE Something like that.

COLTON It took guts to put yourself out there, you know.

JADE And look where I am because of it.

Both look around the store.

COLTON It's just a fork in the road.

JADE You're not the one staring at it.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

An SUV pulls up.

Lenora's son VINCE (50s) exits.

He's short, overweight, and balding.

His finger presses a button on his key fob.

The trunk opens, revealing a box full of comic books.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Vince walks in with the box.

COLTON We're not buying anymore, man.

VINCE I'm looking for Colton.

COLTON You've got two guesses but it should only take you one.

Vince walks up and places the box on the counter.

VINCE My mother said you were ruggedly handsome, like Thor.

COLTON Chris Hemsworth is just pretty--

VINCE

With a beard.

Colton thinks for a moment.

COLTON Lenora mentioned you a lot.

VINCE

Likewise.

They both look around.

Colton looks inside the box and then at Vince.

COLTON

I'm so sorry.

VINCE Sunday, she went in peace.

Jade looks around.

COLTON (to Jade) Lenora had Nuroblastoma.

VINCE I'm shocked she told you.

COLTON

Your mother said that she didn't want any sympathy because she felt that it was more like you were glad it didn't affect you instead of feeling bad for you.

VINCE She was one of a kind.

COLTON I've got cash if--

VINCE

I'm the executor of her will. She wanted you to have them.

Colton goes through the comic books.

He spots the one he sold her last week.

VINCE (CONT'D) It was on her calendar to come here and talk to you. COLTON When's the service?

VINCE We're having the wake tomorrow and then the funeral on Friday.

COLTON

I'll be there.

They shake hands.

Vince leaves.

Colton goes through the box.

JADE I'm so sorry.

COLTON Lenora had great taste in books.

Jade walks over and looks into the box.

JADE Those are all things you like.

COLTON

Exactly.

She walks back in the aisles.

Colton takes out a comic book and looks at it.

COLTON (CONT'D) The last thing we talked about is just screwing with me.

JADE Was it something superhero-related?

COLTON I recommended Scare Tactics to her and then I wanted to pick her mind.

JADE That's... a curious choice.

COLTON I found this great indie film on YouTube called Bandwagon. It's about a band and they go on tour. JADE

Sounds like your kind of movie.

COLTON

One of the songs just hit me, in a way really good music does, and I wanted Erika to hear it. I found it on YouTube, too! I play it and she just kind of went--(mocking Erika's voice) --that's nice.

JADE

Ouch.

COLTON I told that to Lenora and she didn't say much about it.

JADE

It's because Lenora didn't like her and she didn't even have the misfortune to meet her.

COLTON

Misfortune?

JADE

I feel bad that it ended like it ended but you can do better.

COLTON

We've had dinner, all four of us, and not a word!

JADE I was happy you were happy.

COLTON Terry invited her to the Christmas party both years we were together!

JADE He was being nice.

COLTON Terry liked her.

JADE Do you want to bet?

Colton gives her a thumbs up.

COLTON (at Terry's office, loudly) Terry! We need you to settle something for us!

Colton and Jade look at Terry's office.

JADE

He's not walking into this particular minefield.

COLTON

I'll bet you every Kevin Smith copy of Daredevil that he liked her.

JADE And what if he doesn't?

COLTON What's in your pile?

JADE American Vampire Number Four.

COLTON You already own that!

JADE

This has the variant cover by Jim Williams, which is the only one I don't have.

COLTON

Fine, let's make this interesting.

Colton takes his wallet out.

He looks inside.

COLTON (CONT'D) I've got like five bucks and a gift card to AMC in here.

JADE How much is on it?

COLTON Ten bucks, I think.

JADE Why would you keep it? COLTON That's a matinee, easy.

JADE That doesn't even cover the popcorn for the movie!

COLTON I would if the tickets weren't so god-damn expensive.

JADE It's why I stopped going.

COLTON Plus every movie in the theater is on Netflix six weeks later.

JADE So why bother?

Silence.

COLTON Fine, let's have Terry settle this once and for all.

JADE That I can agree on.

Colton walks over to the office.

He knocks on it.

COLTON Terry, you here?

Beat.

Jade opens the door.

Colton looks in.

His jaw drops.

On instinct, he closes the door.

COLTON (CONT'D) You don't want to see what's going on in there.

Jade looks at the door.

JADE

What?

COLTON He's dead and I remember what you told me about finding your mom.

Jade grabs her phone and calls 911.

Colton's eyes focus on the door.

It creaks open.

Colton sees Terry at his desk, dead.

Porn plays on Terry's laptop, his pants around his ankles.

EXT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY (1 HOUR LATER)

FIRST RESPONDERS wheel out Terry's corpse under a blanket. A noticeable erection props it up.

INT. MIDDLE COAST COMICS - DAY

Colton and Jade look around.

JADE What do we tell Lisa?

COLTON He died of a heart attack.

JADE

And--

COLTON Some things can be left unsaid.

Jade takes a deep breath.

JADE We didn't get to say goodbye.

COLTON I would've asked him to wash his hands first.

She glares at him.

What?

JADE You worked for him for how long?

COLTON Some of us handle death poorly.

JADE I'm like this close to crying--

COLTON We need to clear his browser history, for Lisa.

JADE I don't want to look.

Colton walks into the office.

TERRY'S OFFICE

Colton sits down at Terry's desk.

He looks at the laptop.

Jade walks in.

JADE So this is just between us.

COLTON

Everyone else can think he died at work on his final day, and let it be some sort of poetic moment about his life. Lisa deserves to not have those snickers at his funeral if they knew the truth.

JADE

Yeah.

Colton clicks on the computer several times.

His eyes open wide.

COLTON I think he reached the end of internet porn.

JADE

Jesus.

COLTON Terry was like a couple of hours away from his screen going all bluey with--(robotic voice) --you've reached the end of internet porn, please go back.

Jade thinks for a long moment.

JADE Cash your check.

COLTON

Wait, what?

JADE

When someone dies, they freeze their assets just so their lawyer can handle everything.

COLTON

I don't think Lisa--

JADE It's not her, it's the bank.

COLTON I feel a little sleazy even thinking about that.

JADE

My mom has a five thousand dollar annuity that still hasn't paid out. That's what Fred thought he was opening and well... yeah.

COLTON

Fuck.

JADE I hate to be this girl but--

COLTON

You're right.

Colton takes his severance check out.

Jade puts her down on the desk.

Both take their phones out and quickly scan their check.

JADE What do we do now? Colton clears Terry's browser history.

COLTON You'd do it for me, right?

JADE What are you viewing that you want your browsing history cleared after you die?

COLTON Nothing good but--

JADE That was rhetorical!

Colton shrugs.

MAIN STORE

Colton and Jade walk in and look around.

JADE So what do we do?

COLTON Someone called Lisa, right?

JADE The EMS people notify you when someone dies. (beat) When my mom passed, we got a call from their service. She probably is about to get one of her own.

COLTON So what do we do... here? (beat) I'll start making jokes to handle it if she starts crying.

JADE She's not my biggest fan.

COLTON If I call it's going to be--

JADE

I'll handle it.

Jade walks into the back, her cell phone glued to her ear.

Colton is in the aisle, putting a handful of comic books in Lenora's box. He looks around and then to the sky. COLTON I know I should be looking to the ground, based on the stuff you handled yourself too, but I'll give you that final courtesy. Colton laughs. A tear comes down Colton's face. He wipes it off. COLTON (CONT'D) You were a great boss, the best I ever had. I should've told it to your face at least once. (beat) You knew, I hope you did at least. Several more tears come down his Colton wipes them away and looks around. Jade walks back in. JADE She's going to the morgue. COLTON What do we do? JADE Take what we want, lock the place, and mail her the keys. COLTON I'm starting to feel guilty about taking stuff. JADE It's all going to auction after we leave here, if you want to buy what you want then. Jade wanders into the aisles. COLTON It's one thing when he was leaving to travel the world but--

JADE He wanted us to have them. I say we honor that final wish. Both take comic books out. COLTON Is it weird that we never got that bet settled? I want to know. JADE I'm telling you, he wasn't a fan of Erika or Zach. COLTON Why Zach? She thinks for a moment. JADE Oh, that was Lisa. COLTON Women love kids, right? JADE I don't. COLTON What about Fred? JADE Welcome to the latest fight. COLTON So he wants them and you don't? JADE Not now... maybe not ever. Colton stops. She looks at him. Beat. COLTON You're better than this. JADE I've got the weekend to think about everything and--

COLTON What's there to think about?

JADE What about Fred?

COLTON What about him?

JADE We live together!

COLTON

This is the opportunity of a lifetime staring in your face and you're thinking about bullshit. I don't want you to turn it down for mediocrity in some corporate hellhole and a graphic novel that never gets finished because you got busy pumping out crib midgets.

She thinks for a moment.

COLTON (CONT'D) If he's who you think he is, he'll come back and beg for forgiveness.

JADE And if he isn't?

COLTON Then you get to be the biggest mistake he ever made.

Jade looks around.

COLTON (CONT'D)

Plus it'd make for a great comic book, too, and would be a lot more mainstream accessible than someone killing serial killers.

JADE

Hardly. (thinks) Would you take her back?

COLTON That takes a bigger man than me.

JADE Let's say she comes in and begs for your forgiveness. COLTON I'm OK being someone else's regret for once.

Beat.

JADE What are you going to do?

COLTON I think I might try my hand out west. I've got friends out there.

JADE So this is it, huh?

COLTON What do you want to do?

JADE This has been a bit of a day.

COLTON Terry always said the best way to end things is to get wildly shitfaced and cry.

JADE I could be down for that.

COLTON Where do you want to go?

She thinks for a moment.

JADE O'Toole's has nachos and they don't water down their drinks. (beat) If we can finish up in an hour, we can just make the end of half off mojitos too. (beat) I can handle Fred, at some point, just not right now.

COLTON Sounds like a plan.

They take comics out of the boxes.

FADE OUT.
